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INTRODUCTION

Objectives

To end preventable loss of life and to reduce incidents in the Plymouth and surrounding area:

- To increase awareness of everyday risks around water and how to stay safe.
- To reduce the risk to targeted groups.
- To increase awareness of the RNLI.

Location

Plymouth Lifeboat Station is located within the boundary of Millbay Marina. The Lifeboat covers an area approximately stretching Westward to Whitsand Bay and Eastward to Hope Cove and the tidal waters of the Rivers Tamar and Plym, North and North east along with their tributaries. The station is flanked by Looe Lifeboat Station to the West and Salcombe Lifeboat Station to the East. Plymouth Sound and its associated harbours, rivers and anchorages is considered to be one of the safest natural harbours in the UK. It attracts considerable numbers of visitors annually, many of whom are involved in water sports of one type or other. There are three marinas which contain a high proportion of dormitory vessels. The major water sport activities are diving, leisure boating, shore and charter boat angling. The Sutton harbour area is vibrant and contains many pubs and bars with little by way of safety facilities. Access to Sutton Harbour is by lock from approximately 3 hours after HW to 3 hours before HW. During the intervening period, access is free flow. The Rivers Tamar. Plym, Lynher and Tavy display extensive mud flats at low water so are attractive to bait diggers.

The Risks 2008-2014 (DRI Scale)

The DRI scale is a way of analysing and measuring risk, developed by SISORU to use statistical data to prioritise risk mitigation activities.

The DRI scale underpins the original Community Lifesaving Plans and when combined with analytical oversight and expert judgement gives a solid evidence base to plan against for risk mitigation activities.

Observations and Recommendations

Clearly, the greatest number of launches have been to leisure boats but taken in the context of the relative numbers involved, this is not disproportionately high. However, we need to address this issue and a program of targeted presentations and interventions would seem to be the way forward. Specifically, we need to increase our presence at slipways and launching sites, in addition to the traditional visits we make to organised gatherings. The second highest relates to persons in the water or stranded by tides. This is an area where we should have some influence as we have every resource required to address this issue in terms of educating the public. Specifically, we need to address our concerns to young people and having a Youth Education Presenter on the team will doubtless be of considerable value in this respect. Next highest is services to commercial vessels. Given the nature of local commercial activity i.e. deep-sea fishing, this represents a considerable challenge but does not appear disproportionately high given the risky nature of the activity. Fourth highest relates to launches in respect of individuals who are at risk of self harm or are missing and considered vulnerable and consequently outwith our control.

Interestingly, the problems surrounding the activity known as tombstoning cannot be quantified as there exists no specific data in this respect. However, it is known that there has been at least one death, and two other serious injuries caused by this activity in recent years. This knowledge is compounded by the fact that three local schools have asked for visits from the Youth Education Volunteer to present the dangers involved to pupils and there is considerable anecdotal evidence that the activity is on the increase. For these reasons, it has been highlighted as a potential intervention.

In particular there is a concern about those visitors who engage in "single-handed" activities such as stand-up paddle boarding, surfing, kayaking, para-gliding and even dog-walking; there's also concern regarding divers who arrive in the area trailing their own boats sometimes without any experience of diving other than on inland waters and therefore quite unprepared for the effects of tidal streams. By comparison the dive boats are licenced and skippered by professionals. Those operating out of Plymouth are usually very well prepared and equipped and have comprehensive local knowledge.

Trailer Sailers also present some issues in so far as many exhibit little knowledge of safety practices. Particularly at risk are those who arrive in the area from elsewhere and launch from slipways. Often, they are impatient to get on the water so tact needs to be employed if we are to not alienate them from the outset. We should target the following issues:

- Lack of lifejackets
- Lifejackets not fitted correctly
- Young persons on board
- Inadequate clothing and local knowledge

PFD wearing surveys reveal a disappointing number of water users, around 35-40%, are not wearing lifejackets or buoyancy aids. This is most noticeable, but not exclusively, within groups of young persons using high speed craft. The figure varies in direct proportion to the weather conditions, i.e. in fine weather, PFD wear reduces. Experience dictates that water users often react badly to approaches by CSAs trying to encourage PFD wear so perhaps a soft approach with appropriate literature might be most productive.

Lifejacket Clinics carried out by trained advisers reveal disturbing facts. On average, 25% of the lifejackets checked would not have functioned as intended, the owners of which were unaware of the shortcomings. A further 50% displayed minor faults which in themselves would not have prevented the device from working but could produce failures in the long term. Only 25% were found to be without fault. These figures indicate that lack of care is prevalent.
